"St. Joseph Church Garden Watch - Even in Winter"

Glenda Heinz and JoAnn Roth planted 60 white tulips at the St. Joseph Grotto in mid-October 2015.

They planted Double Late Mount Tacoma tulips and Triumph Kansas tulips. They lined the back of the mid-spring bulb garden with white iris bulbs. They topped off the garden with white pansies. Pansies usually can survive the winter if kept moist and bloom until they wilt in the hot weather late next spring.

Marilyn Schartz planted day lily's in several garden areas. Watch for them all to bloom next spring and summer.

The earliest flowers of the year in the St. Joseph Church plant gardens are the tiny Crocus bulbs that usually appear in February at the NE corner of the church rectory.

have a Scavenger Hunt. The students will enjoy Papa Murphy's pizza for lunch.

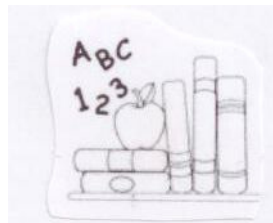

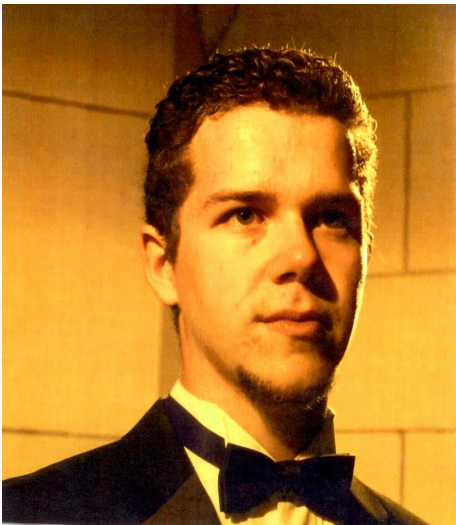

Reflecting on the Works of Mercy This Lenten Season

In an old Peanuts comic strip, Lucy is giving Linus a hard time about wanting to become a doctor. "How can you become a doctor when you don't even love mankind?" "Oh, I love mankind alright," he replied, "it's people I can't stand."

In this Year of Mercy promulgated by Pope Francis, we (the church) are being challenged to examine the ways in which we do or don't love people. Perhaps the notion of mercy could be replaced by the term "compassion".

In part it's based on the Golden Rule - "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you!"

Many of our saints were known for their compassion and mercy towards the less fortunate or the outcasts. Vincent de Paul was concerned about the poor of France; the St. Vincent de Paul society was later founded on the example he exhibited.

Blessed Teresa of Calcutta reached out to the poorest of the poor she found around her. St. John Bosco took care of the abandoned, poor boys of his city and gave them opportunities for work, education and a place to live. Dorothy Day took care of the street people by helping them find shelter, work, food, medical care, education, etc.

Our Church history has produced many saints and would-be-saints taking care of all different parts of society. In this new era WE are being asked to look at how we respond to the spiritual and corporal works of mercy.

During this coming Lenten season reflect on these works of mercy and resolve to be more definite about their practice in our spiritual life. Ask the Lord which he wants YOU to practice more concertedly this year. Read Matthew 25 to help you to decide.

"The Anchor" Officially Opened on January 5th

Remember when the St. Joseph PSR students cancelled their Mission Trip some time ago, and went to work at the Dream Center in Great Bend. They began cleaning up and creating a day shelter in a room on the East side.

Well, that dream is now a reality and opened on January 5th. They will be open on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m.

The Dream Center's purpose is to reconnect isolated people to God and a community of support by providing human services that will address immediate and long-term needs in the areas of homelessness, hunger relief and education.

The Ellinwood young people, along with many adults, including Fr. John, Raechel Manley and Catherine Strecker, painted walls, removed obstacles, and painted the ceiling, put in a ceramic counter for serving, and many other small jobs, helping to create "The Anchor", by which the day shelter is now known.

"The Anchor" contains a Snack Shop which offers a warm, serene environment to enjoy beverages and snacks and apply for services.

An Economic and Employment Services Specialist from the Kansas Department for Children and Families will be available at the Dream Center for several hours, one day per week. This specialist will be able to process applications for assistance, either cash, food or child care.

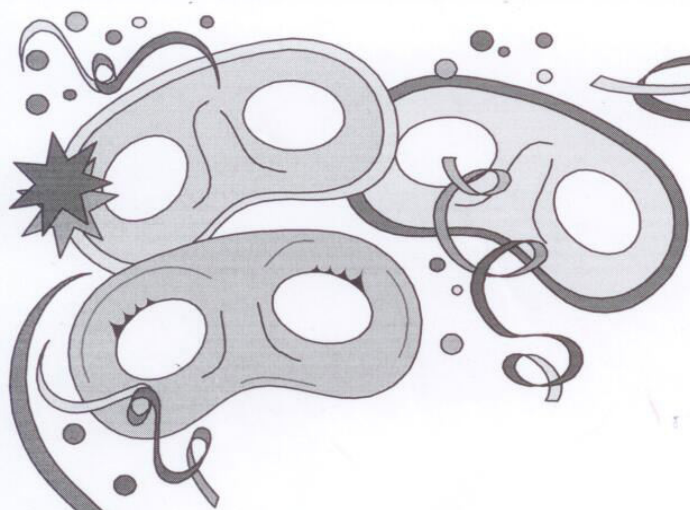
There will be a Mailbox program for those in transition, not having a permanent address that makes applying for jobs difficult. The Anchor also provides them a place to receive mail. There will also be support groups and classes, lifeline phones, financial assistance and Kingdom Klostet, a small boutique, at no cost.

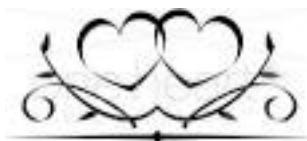

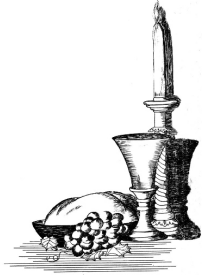
