All About Mass Offerings

Perhaps the best place to begin is by examining the notion that we can offer anything at all to God. It's rooted in the foundational paradox of religion itself. That God, who is almighty and in need of nothing, should want or expect anything from humans takes a bit of pondering. God didn't create us because God needed us. God created us because he wanted to love us. Our great dignity is that God allows us to love him in return. It's in the nature of love to express itself. We express our love for God by obeying his commands, by prayer, and ultimately by joining ourselves to the one offering that truly matters, the obedience of the Son upon the wood of the cross.

The Protestant Reformation deemphasized offerings to God, responding not only to abuses but also arguing that nothing we can do as humans can reach up into God. True enough, save that we have been incorporated into the offering of Jesus Christ. And being human, we must find a way to express our love. Hence the need to make offerings, to practice asceticism. True, the gulf between giver and receiver is immense, but does any parent shun a child's offering because it's crudely made?

In the earliest years of the Church, people brought offering to Mass, primarily in the form of food

stuffs. Bread and wine were needed for the Eucharist; and oil, for the many anointing's practiced by the Church. But the faithful also brought livestock and other goods, which were used to support the priest who offered the Mass. By the way, this is the origin of the priest washing his hands at the preparation of the gifts. If you are collecting chickens and goats, you would indeed want to wash up a bit before offering the Eucharist.

Like most things over time, this changed from goods-in-kind to monetary offerings. As was generally the case in ancient societies, wealthy families essentially "sponsored" the Mass by providing for its material needs and the needs of the priests who offered the Mass. Hence, the Mass offering as we now know it.

In both the ancient Church and the contemporary one, the fact that the Mass is being offered for the intention of a donor does not mean that we limit, or direct, the action of God's grace, won for us in Christ and made effective for us in the Mass. Everyone who comes to Mass brings intentions, and when the Church gathers for Eucharist she prays for all of her needs and those of the world. This is why there is an instruction saying that the Mass intention is not to be announced in the Mass, for example in the Prayers of the Faithful. Those who gave the stipend from the Mass have already made the offering, which they can expect God to receive with favor. That's why, as a

cluster, although we move offerings for health or rain as fast as we can through the system, you don't have to worry about the Good Lord, waiting for the Mass to be said before he responds.

A few other items to note. Every pastor is responsible for saying a Sunday Mass each week for all the people of the parish, for which he receives no stipend. In Canon Law this is called the *Pro populo* Mass. He doesn't himself need to say it, but he must insure that it is said. When I'm on vacation, the visiting priest offers the intention, and the bishop does when he visits. This is why each weekend, you see "For the cluster" in the list of weekend Mass intentions.



Mass intentions are still used for the support of priests, although, in the contemporary Church, diocesan priests receive a salary in addition to their stipends. This is why Canon Law says that when a parish has more Masses than can be celebrated in a reasonable time, these intentions are to be forwarded to retired and missionary priests, who don't have access to any other intentions. We never forward individual Masses, only some of those received in large multiples. We don't have enough to forward to the missions, and now we have difficulty in supplying our own Dodge City priests, who are retired, with Masses.

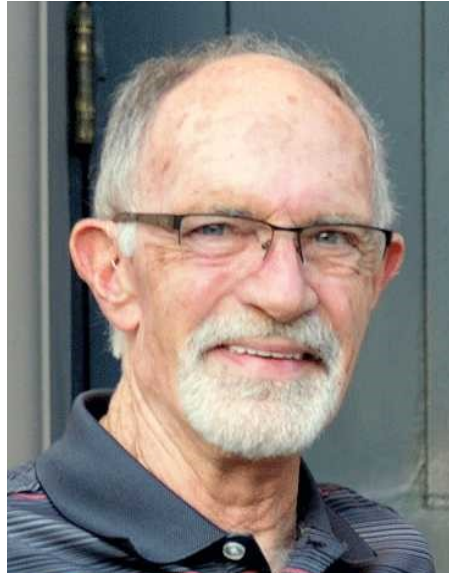


From a Sunday Reading
