How to get more out of Mass



I'm often asked this question, perhaps because Mass doesn't come naturally to the modern, media-saturated person. We're used to being over-stimulated. It's hard to approach an activity seeking to calm, console, and enlighten us. Here are my seven suggestions to get more out of Mass.

Go every week. The Mass is a divine and a human reality. It comes as pure gift of God but, as St. Thomas Aquinas insisted, grace builds upon nature. So the same rule that applies to exercise and piano practice and shooting baskets applies to the Mass. The more you do it, the better you will get at it. Those who go to Mass every week become more accustomed to its movements, which means that they are more likely to notice, and appreciate, how the Mass changes with the seasons.

Going every week, imposing this upon yourself as a non-negotiable, teaches you an essential truth, one that is needed to properly understand what you are doing each Sunday. Mass isn't something that you offer to the Lord when it meets your schedule. You owe your creator divine worship, and in the manner that Christ Our Lord established, which is our Mass. The modern world places you, the individual, at the center of everything, exercising your choice. That doesn't correspond to revelation. We are creatures. Everything we have is given

to us by God. Why must so many of us experience a serious set-back before we realize this and act upon it?

Mass is a corporate act, something akin to a pep rally or a team in sports. The more each individual contributes to the Mass, the more everyone else draws from it. Imagine how much more inspiring the Mass would be if every Catholic were there every weekend!

Get there earlier than you do. Ten minutes of private prayer in the pew will calm you, help you to leave the demanding world at the door. A person who has been praying privately with the Lord is more ready for Mass than the person who comes late or enters with the priest. And I can't even think of something nice to say about those who leave early!



Sit up front. Let's begin by exposing a lie. Catholics don't sit in the back of the church because they are "more humble" than the ones up front. The truth is that they sit in the back because it's a position of power. You see what might go wrong up front, what might be potentially embarrassing, but others don't see you. The back of the church, except for questions of health, is for frightened people who don't want to give up control.

If you, and your children, sit up front you will see more. You will notice more. You'll even hear more. Not what is happening in the pews, which is simply being nosy, but what is happening in the sanctuary, where Christ comes to be with his people.

Even unruly kids do better in front. They are able to see more than the backs of the people in front of them, and, if you have to take them out of church, the longer walk tends to settle them.

Put down the book. Following along in the missal is like going to a play and reading the script instead of watching the play. The readings were meant to be proclaimed and heard, not read and certainly not scanned to see if the lector makes a mistake. If you need to read because you can't hear, we hope someday soon to offer a system that will bring the audio into your own hearing aide. If your head is in a book, you're not seeing gestures, colors, postures, and movements: all of which are part of the Mass that the Lord gave us.

Pick up the book when it's time to sing. Do you think that you sing worse than Father? Do you think he sings, because he thinks that he is good at it? The more everyone sings, the better everyone sounds. It's too bad that pastors can't kick parishioners in

Volunteer to be a liturgical minister: Again that old rule of life applies. The more you put in, the more you will receive. First, we always need more ministers in every parish. Secondly, there is richness, a blessing, that comes to the person who lectures, who serves, who helps with the distribution of Holy Communion. It's also a great way to meet other people in the parish. And again, you can tell yourself that your humility holds you back. I'll again remind you that you are afraid and want to maintain control for yourself.

Donate more. Do you think I am kidding? Remember that sound system that would come directly into a personal hearing aid? We'd have one, if we had more money. We'd have better sound systems for everyone if we could afford to pay for a company to come in and analyze our churches. We do the best we can with what we've got. We reimburse our organists a tiny bit, most of which comes right back to us. The day may come when we really have to pay to have a talented person to come and play for us. Artistic quality follows money. Always has; always will.

There you go. Seven ways to make Mass into something richer for yourself and, most importantly, for those who depend upon you because you are their fellow parishioner.

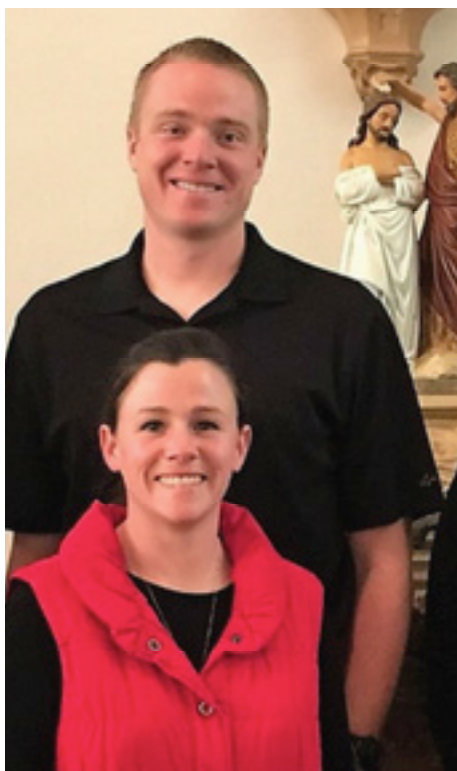


Mary - May is the month of Mary, and we honored the Mother of our Savior with May Crowning on Wednesday, May 2.

Endowment Report

The Board of Directors of St. Joseph School Education Endowment Fund voted to increase its monthly donation to St. Joseph School from \$5,500 to \$6,500. This will be \$78,000 per year and is 6% of the value of the fund. The Edward Jones advisors have told the Board of Directors that with a payout of 6%, the principle should remain intact. This increase has been made possible due to the generous donations of parishioners and alumni. Donations to St. Joseph School Education Endowment Fund can be made in many ways: cash, grain, stocks, annuities, and even a term limit in a producing oil lease. Currently the Endowment receives around \$700 per month from a ten year interest in a producing oil lease. After the ten years the mineral interest will return to the family. Lawrence Liebl celebrated his 96th birthday this past year on October 14, 2017. That makes him one of the oldest living Immaculate Conception Parishioner. Lawrence was born October 14, 1921 to Joe and Frances (Schulte) Liebl on the farmstead near Claflin. He was the second youngest child and is the last surviving sibling, with having two sisters, Viola (Liebl) Feist, Theresa (Liebl) Miller, and five brothers, Frank Liebl, Leo Liebl, Ambrose Liebl, Joseph Liebl and youngest brother Gail Liebl.

Lawrence grew up and worked on the family farm. He remembers coming to Claflin as a young boy on a Saturday night which was a busy night in town. The dads were drinking beer and the moms would sit on Main Street. There was dancing in the opera house and an outdoor theatre. He remembers the dust bowl years in the 1930's, when there were times that the sky was blackened and all you could see was the top of the fence post poking out of the dust.

Lawrence went to school and graduated from Claflin High School in 1940. Lawrence went off to college at Kansas State University in the fall of 1940 for one year, majoring in Business and Public Administration before being drafted into the United States Army. He served from September 1942 till his Honorable Discharge in March 1946, where he served as a Medical Technician and Clerk.

On April 26, 1949, Lawrence married Mary Ann Kimpler at St. Peter and Paul Church near Ellinwood. Shortly after getting married, they moved out to Stratton, Colorado, to farm with Lawrence's brothers. While in Stratton, they started their family, having two of their six children. Mary Ann soon became homesick and they packed up and moved back to the family farm near Claflin. There they continued to farm and raise the rest of their family. After retirement, Lawrence continued to be involved with his two son's farming practices.

Lawrence played a vital part serving at Immaculate Conception Parish. He volunteered as a Lector, Eucharistic Minister and was also active in the Knights of Columbus. Living across the street from the rectory, Lawrence and

Mary Ann cooked and fed visiting priests on many occasions.

Lawrence and Mary Ann were able to enjoy some traveling and gambling before Mary Ann passed away in August 1998. He loves music, especially polka music and country music because it tells a story. Lawrence was able to remain in his home until December 2016, and he now resides at Country Living Place in Hoisington.

Lawrence's family includes five sons and one daughter, 18 grandchildren, 19 great grandchildren, with one great grandchild due in June and 3 step great grandchildren.

Kenneth Liebl lives in Claflin and has four children. Chad Liebl is married to Sarah, they live in Hutchinson and they have two daughters, Lauren and Claire. 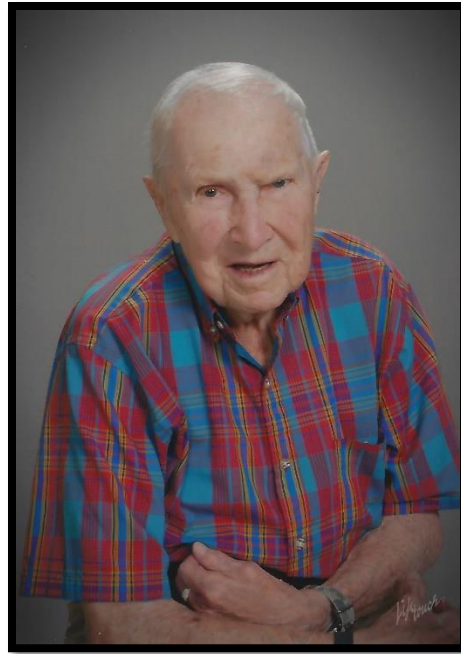

Can You Help A Child in Need?

There are currently more than 6,200 children in out of home placement throughout the state of Kansas. In Barton County, there are 109 children placed in out of home placement. Out of the 109 children, 43 of these children have to travel far away from their home community for placement. They have to leave everything familiar to them including their school and friends. There are currently 20 St. Francis Community Services licensed foster homes in Barton County. There is a need for 25+ **more** licensed homes in Barton County. The Family Crisis Center, Inc., based in Great Bend, began in April of 1981 when a group of women saw a need and began answering a crisis line to help those who had no where else to turn. The group of committed community members along with Catholic Social Service worked to make the Family Crisis Center a reality.

The mission of the Domestic and Sexual Violence Center (DSVC): Providing survivors of domestic and sexual violence, their families and friends, advocacy and services while encouraging social change through awareness, education, and prevention. It creates a safe environment for survivors of domestic violence and sexual assault to understand the resources and options available to them and get support as they begin to heal from the trauma. Services are available 24-hours a day, seven days a week and are provided in Barton, Barber, Comanche, Edwards, Kiowa, Ness, Pawnee, Pratt, Rush, and Stafford counties.

The mission of the Dell Hayden Memorial Child Advocacy Center (CAC): Providing victims of child abuse and their families a multidisciplinary response, advocacy and support to reduce trauma and hold perpetrators accountable while creating a safer community through awareness, education, and prevention. It is named after the first director of the Family Crisis Center, and creates a safe, family-friendly environment for children and families. The CAC becomes involved with the children and families upon referral from Department for Children and Families (DCF) and/or Law Enforcement to assist with the investigative process and provide services through referrals and advocacy to the child and family. Services are provided in Barton, Pawnee, Rush and Stafford Counties.
