Can't tell where God is calling you?

Follow your wounds.

I miss roadmaps. I realize that Global Positioning Systems represent an important advance, but my relationship with them is ambiguous at best. Sometimes they're just wrong, and they refuse to admit it. I once followed GPS guidance through a square mile section of Buffalo, N.Y., where I had never been before or since. Not one to argue with "science," I made the same loop through the same neighborhood three or four times before admitting that no exit was on the agenda.

And, if you fail to follow an instruction, how do they program the voice to say "recalculating" with such a tone of condescension? It might as well just say, "What part of 'take the next right' do you not understand?"

GPS also promises to simplify the search for essential roadside services. Evidently, that is limited to service stations and emergency medical services. I for one consider Dairy Queen an essential roadside service. Why isn't there a DQ button on the dash, which simply overrides the tracking system? Aren't we close to a technology where with one push of a button the car just drives itself to the nearest Dairy Queen?

The Lord sends you forth not only to heal and save others but, in doing so and by his grace, to do the same for ourselves.

I also resent the way the GPS spoon-feeds me information. Yes, I can zoom out to see my entire route to a small western Kansas town near the Colorado border. But what if I'd like to know if Highway 4 continues on into Colorado? My GPS takes the attitude

that if I wanted to know about Colorado I should have asked, three hours ago, when we started. It zooms out to show the entire North American continent as if to say, "Am I supposed to respond to every rumination you've got about this place?" GPS takes no responsibility for what you might call "the big picture."

When the Prophet Amos is rudely dismissed by Amaziah, a priest of the Bethel sanctuary, he responds by identifying the warrant for his dire



warning. God is guiding him.

I was no prophet, nor have I belonged to a company of prophets; I was a shepherd and a dresser of sycamores.

The Lord took me from following the flock, and said to me, Go, prophesy to my people Israel (Amos 7:14-15). Prophets are sent out to prepare God's way, to carry God's message, to be God's presence. Consider how detailed are the instructions that Jesus offers to his disciples: He instructed them to take nothing for the journey but a walking stick— no food, no sack, no money in their belts.

They were, however, to wear sandals but not a second tunic. He said

to them, "Wherever you enter a house, stay there until you leave.

Whatever place does not welcome you or listen to you, leave there and shake the dust off your feet in testimony against them" (Mk 6:8-11).

Not to quibble with our Lord, but did you notice a rather key element, missing in his mission prep? He does not tell his disciples where to go. Are they supposed to figure this out for themselves? Are we supposed to do the same? Seems like an important question, seeing that we speak of ourselves as being sent into the world.

What does it mean to let your weakness lead you?

So, if you're wondering, where am I being sent? Where does the Lord want me to go? Here is a partial piece of the puzzle: Follow your wound. Follow that part of you that is hurt, incomplete and wanting, because the Lord sends you forth not only to heal and save others but, in doing so and by his grace, to do the same for ourselves. That is just how clever the Lord is. He sends the wounded walking, knowing that their healing lies ahead in a life shared with others.

Some might suspect that mission should be rooted in our strengths, not our wounds. But Jesus himself says: "Those who are well do not need a physician, but the sick do. I did not come to call the righteous but sinners" (Mk 2:17). Those who rely on their own strengths for ministry can be tempted to be judgmental, to look down upon those whom they view as weak.

What does it mean to let your weakness lead you? If you recognize

that you know nothing about what it means to be poor, if you correctly suspect that you are wrong in thinking that the poor are poor because of their moral failure, that is your wound. Now go out and serve the poor.

Much as I hate to admit it, the Good Lord does not spread his map before us.

If you're lonely, if you feel that the world has forgotten you, think of someone you have almost forgotten. Go see them; give them a call.

Improvements at School

Beginning June 25, an asbestos removal team moved in to begin tearing out old flooring from the girls' and boys' restrooms as the first step in the school's restroom remodel. It has been well over twenty years since any changes have been made to the restrooms, and they were most certainly showing their age. Dingy, worn flooring, stained ceiling tiles, damaged sheet rock, and cracked sink bowls are just some of the items that are being replaced to improve our facility.

At this writing, all the old flooring is gone, and new flooring is being installed. A waterproof panel has been installed behind the toilets and sinks. New sinks are installed, and a false wall has been built to hide the plumbing for the urinals. Work is progressing smoothly and will be done well before the school year begins.

For the last 7 years, a group of men have met on Friday mornings during Lent for study, discussion, fellowship, and a light breakfast. The faithful group typically follows a video series on a particular topic to lead small group discussions. After Lent, the group was done until the next year.

This past Spring, several members of the men's group decided to continue meeting after the Lenten season, but with a slightly different format. The group (typically 7-14 faithful men) meets every Friday at 6:15a.m. at The Gather, in downtown Ellinwood. Meetings still involve study, discussion, fellowship, and some breakfast, but the group has chosen to study the coming weekend's scripture readings.

Attendees take turns reading aloud the three readings and footnotes supplied in one of the lector's workbooks. After each reading, discussions ensue regarding parts of the readings that strike a chord with each individual. A common theme that arises each week is that the group leaves with more questions than answers; however, all participants have agreed that this pre-study of the Sunday readings provides a more meaningful and thought-provoking experience in Mass. Hearing the readings, sharing others' impressions of them, and having a couple days to ponder the meanings has proved to be beneficial.

Come to the Library



If you are in our parish cluster (St. Joseph, Holy Family, or Immaculate Conception) and do not have a home computer or internet on your phone, you can go to your library to see your church online webpage, which is full of news and pictures about your church, without giving any of your personal information.

The reason you do not have to give personal information is that the library is already signed on to the computer that you are using. In Ellinwood library you click on Google Chrome or Mozilla Firefox, wait a moment, and let it come to the library sign on page which is the school page.

Then you click on the address box in the upper left corner, it will highlight, and you type your church address in the address box.

Bring a copy of the bulletin with you. Your church address is in the bulletin. Click Enter on the keyboard and you will come to your church page on the web.

Bring a pair of ear buds or a headset to listen to homilies. Some of the homilies are in text to read.

The computer tower next to the keyboard and computer screen is where to plug into Headset icon, usually the top port on the tower. Plug in your headset to port. Library staff can help you adjust volume. The friendly library staff will help you if you have any trouble. The Ellinwood library also has coffee, tea, or cocoa for your enjoyment for a small fee.

Expanding an Unending Love

The Growth of CarePortal

God is doing big things through CarePortal! On July 7, 2018, the second annual BIG Event – *Build, Invest, Grow* - was held at the JM Collingwood Barn near Pretty Prairie. It was a family-friendly celebration that included worship music (Matt Schaffner of Heartland Community Church of Great Bend), testimonies/speeches, and games for kids. It also served as a fundraiser to help sustain the CarePortal ministry and is a celebration of what God is doing through CarePortal churches. The event was made possible by donations from individuals and businesses. The families and churches in attendance enjoyed a pulled pork dinner, ice cream, cotton candy, and CarePortal t-shirts, all free of charge.

Joe Knittig of the Global Orphan Project (the mother-ship of CarePortal) spoke of how Kansas is leading the charge in the growth of CarePortal. In his opinion, "What has been given to Caesar belongs to the churches." The government is overwhelmed with the needs of the foster care system, and the local church is the answer for the brokenness; it can be part of the solution, too. Knittig also spoke of a goal where there will be more families waiting for children than children waiting for families in the next three years. In his words, we need to "serve the God of the universe—not a pocket Jesus that only comes out occasionally when it is convenient." He also said, "I don't want CarePortal to be the hero... CarePortal is a tool for local churches that want to say 'Not on our watch. Not in our community.'"

Hallie Cable and Jocelyn Busick, regional managers for CarePortal, thanked the churches



for their commitment to foster care. Their goals include enrolling more churches, growing CarePortal to every county in Kansas, and having more foster homes, because every child deserves a safe home. There were also speakers from Saint Francis Community Services and Circles of Hope. The CarePortal point person from the Buhler Mennonite Brethren Church gave these words of wisdom, saying, "Love one another and be his hands and feet... the rest will fall into place. Turn this world around."

The evening concluded with the personal testimony of Bubba Dowling along with his strong-man performance. Bubba is the newest CarePortal regional manager in Kansas. Attending the event from Immaculate Conception Church were Ray and Sandi Oberle along with their daughter, Rebecca Oberle.



Care Portal spans across 16 states with over 1,500 churches nationwide, 210 of which are in Kansas. Over 26,000 children have been served nationally, 4,000 of which are in Kansas.

CarePortal events in the coming year include trainings for newly enrolled churches, Active Community gatherings, Stand Sunday, Poverty simulations, the GRID Conference, Social Work Month appreciation, the 3rd annual BIG Event, and Tier 2 partner events and trainings (Youthrive and Protective Homes).
